## Three Notable CSUN Alumni to Be Honored at Event

*Leichtman, Myman and Warren to Receive Alumni Association's Top Recognition*

California State University, Northridge will pay tribute to three alumni whose achievements place them at the summit of their professions at its 12th Annual Distinguished Alumni Awards scheduled for Saturday, April 24.

The fields of business, law, entertainment and music are represented in the 2010 recipients: Lauren Leichtman, CEO and founding principal of the private investment firm Levine Leichtman Capital Partners; Robert M. Myman, founding partner of one of the city's leading entertainment law firms, Myman, Abell, Greenspan, Fineman, Fox & Light, LLP; and Grammy Award-winning songwriter Diane Warren.

The trio will be honored at a special dinner at the Four Seasons Hotel in Westlake Village. The evening will begin with a reception at 6:30 p.m., followed by the dinner and awards program. Serving as master of ceremonies for the evening will be Northridge alumnus Bill Griffith '80 (Journalism), author, CNBC anchor and a former Distinguished Alumni Award recipient.

This year's honorees join a notable group of past recipients which includes Governor of Hawaii Linda Lingle, Curb Records Chairman and former

"There's no better way to judge a university's quality than to see how successful its alumni have become," said D.G. "Gray" Mounger, assistant vice president for alumni relations at CSUN. "The current and past recipients of the Cal State Northridge Distinguished Alumni Awards are among the nation's very best in their chosen fields of endeavor."

Leichtman '72 (Psychology) is CEO and founding principal of Levine Leichtman Capital Partners. She co-founded the Beverly Hills-based private

investment firm in 1984 with her husband, Arthur Levine. A dedicated and civic-minded philanthropist, Leichtman has served on several charitable boards, including the Los Angeles Opera, the UCLA Iris Cantor Women's Health Center, Aviva Family and Children's Services and Wilshire Boulevard Temple. She and her husband are recipients of the Cedars-Sinai Board of Governors Humanitarian Award.

Myman '67 (Political Science) is a founding partner of Myman, Abell, Greenspan, Fineman, Fox & Light, LLP, a leading entertainment law firm. He has been honored by the Century City Bar Association as Entertainment Attorney of the Year, the Hollywood

Reporter's Power List and the New York Times' and Los Angeles Magazine's "Super Lawyer" lists. Myman was managing director of talent for the 52nd and 53rd Presidential Inaugurals and is an Emmy Award-nominated television producer. He also plays Masters' Water Polo.

Warren '78 (Music) is one of the most successful and prolific songwriters of all time. Her songs have been featured in more than 100 motion pictures, resulting in six Academy Award nominations. Additionally, she received nine Grammy Award nominations, and won once. She also received a Golden Globe, having been nominated for the award four times. Warren has been named American Society of Composers, Authors and Publishers' Songwriter of the Year six times. She has written for such diverse artists as Aerosmith, Jennifer Hudson, Carrie Underwood, Mariah Carey, Whitney Houston, Celine Dion and LeAnn Rimes. Warren owns her own publishing company, Realsongs, the most successful female-owned and operated business in the music industry.

## CSUN to Host Inaugural Eisner Lecture and Colloquium

*Under Secretary of Education Martha Kanter to Serve as Keynote Speaker*

U.S. Department of Education Under Secretary of Education Martha Kanter will be the keynote speaker at the inaugural Eisner Education Lecture and Colloquium on Tuesday, May 4.

Kanter was nominated by President Obama on April 29, 2009, to be the under secretary of education and was confirmed by the Senate on June 19, 2009. In this position, she reports to Secretary of Education Arne Duncan and oversees policies, programs and activities related to postsecondary education, vocational and adult education and federal student aid.

She is the first community college leader to serve in the under secretary position. From 2003 to 2009, Kanter served as chancellor of the Foothill-De Anza Community College District, one of the largest community college districts in the nation, serving more than 45,000 students with a total budget of approximately \$400 million.

"The Inaugural Eisner Education Lecture and Colloquium will showcase California State University, Northridge's commitment to excellence and to building alliances with the community by bringing together partners from local schools, businesses, government, and social agencies—all sharing a vision of improving educational

opportunities and outcomes for members of the greater Los Angeles area," said Michael E. Spagna, dean of the Michael D. Eisner College of Education.

The day will include a colloquium from 1:30–3 p.m. in Nordhoff Hall, a

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# Special Education Program Awarded \$8.4 Million U.S. Grant

*Federal Funding to Address Shortage of Qualified Special Education Teachers*

The U.S. Department of Education has awarded California State University, Northridge more than \$8.4 million in federal funding over five years to improve the education of teachers who work with students with disabilities.

The Teacher Quality Partnership grant, funded by the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act, will be used to offer an integrated credential/master's degree teacher residency program designed to reform traditional university teacher preparation. It will address the critical shortage of qualified special education teachers who are prepared to serve in "high need" schools.

"California State University, Northridge is proud to be an institution working to reform teacher education through teacher residency programs," said President Jolene Koester. "This grant is a strong statement of support for the great work happening on the

Cal State Northridge campus and in our partner schools in the Los Angeles Unified School District. The program will not only provide positive outcomes for our region, but also produce outcomes that could help inform teacher residency programs across the nation."

The Michael D. Eisner College of Education and the College of Humanities will work in partnership with the Los Angeles Unified School District. The program will recruit a total of 150 special education teachers from culturally and linguistically diverse backgrounds, prepare them to serve children with disabilities in high-need schools and evaluate the impact of the project on new teachers and their students. The program will offer an 18-month credential/master's degree residency program in special education, and a two-year induction program.

"This grant further advances our

collective work, in partnership with the Los Angeles Unified School District, to prepare highly effective teachers who make a difference in the educational lives of students in the greater Los Angeles area," said Michael Spagna, dean of the Michael D. Eisner College of Education. "It is through our attention to the single most important school-related factor affecting student academic performance—the quality of the teacher—that we will truly improve our schools."

The Michael D. Eisner College of Education is one of the largest public colleges of education in California. It is nationally recognized for its innovative approach in providing exemplary programs to prepare highly qualified teachers, school administrators, counselors, and deaf studies professionals. Though the college traditionally ranks as one of the largest colleges of education in California, it

offers small classes and personal attention. It is known for its strong sense of community within the college, as well as for its expert faculty and cutting-edge programming.

Sherman Oaks Rep. Brad Sherman, who voted for the legislation that is providing the funding, said Cal State Northridge is "recognized for its exemplary programs to prepare highly qualified teachers and develop partnerships with high-need schools."

"Once again, CSUN stands at the forefront in teacher preparation and training and improving student achievement in our local schools."

Congressman Sherman has secured nearly \$2.4 million in federal appropriations funding for a variety of programs and projects at Cal State Northridge, including teacher education and arts education programs, as well as funding for the construction of the Valley Performing Arts Center and an on-campus transit center. ■

## Jazz 'A' Band to Perform at the Monterey Jazz Festival

*The Josiah Boornazian and Juan Trujillo Combo Band Also to Perform at 53rd Annual Event*

Cal State Northridge's Jazz "A" Band and two other groups have been selected to perform at the Monterey Jazz Festival, one of the most prestigious and longest running jazz festivals in the world.

A combo band featuring CSUN music students Josiah Boornazian and Juan Trujillo also placed in the festival's "Next Generation" competition's open combo division. The two bands were picked from among dozens of the country's top college music bands to perform at the 53rd annual event in Monterey on Sept. 17-19.

"You have a jazz program that's very, very special," said Timothy Orr, a spokesman for the jazz festival. While the jazz festival attracts the best bands from throughout the world, Orr said California colleges like Cal

State Northridge routinely do well in the competition.

This is the second time in three years that CSUN's Jazz "A" Band will perform at the jazz festival.

"This is quite a privilege," said Gary Pratt, co-director of CSUN's Jazz Studies Program. "We invest a lot in our students here."

Every spring, the Monterey Jazz Festival invites the top student musicians from across the country and around the world to participate in the Next Generation Jazz Festival. This year's competition took place April 9-11.

The three-day event includes performances by middle school through college level ensembles as well as competitions, with awards going to the top high school and

college vocalists, bands and combo groups. The event also includes a composition competition.

The winners are given an opportunity to perform at the historic jazz festival and win a cash prize. CSUN's bands will be two of the three college groups performing.

The Jazz "A" Band is recognized as one of the finest college jazz bands in the nation. The band's recordings are heard on jazz radio stations around the world and have received rave reviews. The newest recording, "CSUN Originals II - Rain Song" was released in 2008 and is the Jazz Program's second album to exclusively feature student arrangements and compositions.

The Josiah Boornazian and Juan Trujillo bands are made up of current CSUN students. ■

## CSUN Receives Bequest for Endowment in Political Science

*The \$409,000 Bequest Will Honor the Late Eugene Price with First Endowed Professorship in Political Science*

Cal State Northridge has received a \$409,000 bequest from Richard John in memory of his late partner Eugene Price, a popular constitutional law professor in the university's Department of Political Science. Price, who passed away in 2007, was a favorite among students during the more than 30 years he taught at Cal State Northridge.

"It is both timely and fitting that the Department of Political Science will house an endowed professorship in the name of Eugene Price," said Stella Theodoulou, dean of the College of Social and Behavioral Sciences. "Professor Price's work and commitment to students will endure through the generosity of Richard John."

Richard John died in 2009.

A reception celebrating the gift and honoring John and Price is scheduled to take place at 2:30 p.m. on Thursday, April 29, in the Whitsett Room of Sierra Hall on the west side of the campus. The public is invited to attend.

Price and John met and became life partners in Berkeley, Calif. Price was earning his doctoral degree in political science from the University of California at Berkeley. From the early 1950s until about 1977, John owned a flower shop in Berkeley named "Rick's Florist." After moving to Los Angeles, John worked at a flower shop in the city of San Fernando for 20 years.

Shortly after receiving his doctorate in 1963, Price joined the faculty of what was then San Fernando Valley

State College. Price's courses on the U.S. Constitution were legendary for their depth and the professor's concern for his students, earning him the college's Distinguished Teaching Award in 1967.

"He solidified my intention of going to law school," said Santa Monica Superior Court Judge Gerald Rosenberg '72 (Political Science), who took several classes with Price. "He taught Socratically. We read the cases and discussed them as he roamed around the class."

David Schwartz '92 (Political Science), John's attorney, said Price also inspired him to apply to law school.

"I recall looking forward to his Constitutional Law courses," said

Schwartz. "Hopefully the legacy created by John's bequest will have the same impact on future students as it did on me."

Price, who was affectionately referred to as "Doc" by his students, retired from Cal State Northridge in 1994 and took *emeritus* status in 1994, though he continued to teach an occasional class for several more years.

"It was always Richard's belief that Gene lived for teaching and that he was happier at Cal State Northridge than at any other time in his life," said Rob Ziese, trustee of Richard John's estate.

## Associate Vice President of Academic Resources to Retire

Longtime Cal State Northridge administrator Spero Bowman, associate vice president of academic resources and planning, will retire in May after more than 28 years of dedicated service.

"I have a lot of fond memories," said Bowman about his time at CSUN. He said he plans to spend more time with his wife and continue his work with a nonprofit group that supports developmentally disabled adults.

Bowman began his career at CSUN in 1982 in what is now the Mike Curb College of Arts, Media, and Communication as an administrative program specialist, which was later changed to manager of academic resources. In 1987, he

went to work in what is now the College of Health and Human Development as the manager of academic resources. He served as director of academic resources from 1996–1999, and from 1999–2005, he served as both associate vice president of academic resources and chief information officer for information technology resources.

He has served as associate vice president of academic resources and planning for the last five years.

"He is a jack of all trades," said Provost and Vice President for Academic Affairs Harry Hellenbrand, who hosted a retirement celebration for Bowman at the Orange Grove Bistro earlier this month. "He is just one of those guys who knows how to figure things out."

Bowman attended Brigham Young University where he played football and earned both a bachelor's and master's degree. He earned a doctorate from the UCLA Graduate School of Education.

## CSUN Professor Receives California Music Educators Award
